

Not only will you take home a pay cheque, you'll earn up to **16 credits** towards your high school diploma, and log **480 training hours** towards your trade credential.

# What is an Apprenticeship?

A trade apprenticeship is how you gain the knowledge and skills you need for a career in your trade.

Most apprenticeships take about four years to complete.

You'll spend approximately six to eight weeks per year in the classroom or shop learning from an instructor. The rest of the year, you'll learn, working on a job site alongside experienced tradespeople and getting paid to do it.

## 20% CLASSROOM TRAINING

In a classroom or shop at a university, college or private institution.

## 80% WORK-BASED TRAINING

Earn while you learn on a job site, working alongside your employer sponsor and experienced tradespeople in your field.
